2020 Mary Dupre Awards Announced

WOONSOCKET – Ballou Home for the Aged is among the 21 percent of U.S. skilled nursing facilities that have been recognized as a Best Nursing Home for 2020-21 by U.S. News & World Report.

The home earned Best Nursing Homes status by achieving a rating of "High Performing," the highest possible rating, for both Short Term Rehabilitation and Long-Term Care. U.S. News gives the designation of Best Nursing Home only to those homes that satisfy U.S. News' assessment of the appropriate use of key services and consistent performance in quality measures.

A look from the inside

LIFE AT BALLOU DURING A PANDEMIC

Readers will be happy to learn that, as of this writing, there are no current Covid-19 cases at BallouLife Communities. Residents and staff are checked weekly and we are extremely fortunate that our home is Covid-free.

Mitigation efforts began at the beginning of March with certain mandates set forth by the Rhode Island Department of Health and CDC/CMS. Among these were a no-visitor policy and no group activities, including communal dining. This mandate was eased over the summer but, unfortunately, was reinstated at the beginning of November as cases of Covid-19 increased in the community, in hospitals and in congregate care settings.

These things alone put unimaginable strains on our staff with the potential of feelings of loneliness and despair among our residents, who, for the most part, had to stay in their rooms. The Department of Health is now looking at ways to allow family members to visit their loved ones.

Our professional and dedicated staff met the challenge, keeping the welfare of our residents and their families as their top priority. The following is how some of our staff met the challenge of serving our residents while carrying out our state mandates.

Tiffany Frappier, Director of Food Services

Services - Since there was no group dining, residents had to be served meals in their rooms. To do this, additional food service staff had to be hired in order to deliver meals to resident rooms in a timely manner and in order to keep the food warm. Tiffany will soon acquire food service carts to help make this delivery process more efficient.



Tina Senecal, Director of Life Enrichment

Enrichment – Because of a no-visitor policy and the curtailment of group activities, Tina had to find new ways to connect residents with their families. She began a schedule of Facetime calls between residents and their families.



She now has I-Pads to use to replace the use of her cell phone. The screen is larger on the I-Pad and should prove to be an all-around better visual and auditory experience. I-Pads were purchased through a Digital Device Grant.



Jocelyn Dubois, RN, MSW, LCSW, Director of Social Services

Jocelyn has been the “Great Communicator,” through all of this, reaching out to families at least weekly if not more often. Because of her background, she talks to family members on an emotional level, listening to a family member’s concerns about their loved one and about themselves, too. Jocelyn is able to provide emotional support to families and to convey a positive sense of hope for the future.

Ruth A. Daly, MBA, RN, Certified Infection Preventionist

– On Ruth’s shoulders lies the full responsibility of overseeing the steps that are taken to prevent the spread of Covid-19 at BallouLife Communities. She writes the weekly updates that are posted on our website, Facebook and mailed to family members. She reports data back to the appropriate officials. She puts plans together, which have to be approved by both the Rhode Island Department of Health and CDC/CMS of things that we will do to mitigate the spread of the virus, updating them when necessary. Ruth does her job so well that Ballou Home was recently awarded a cash incentive grant for meeting the Standards of Practice in mitigating the spread of Covid-19 since its inception.

These are just some examples of staff that have risen to the challenge of staving off the virus. In fact, all staff have done their part in keeping our home safe and secure. Housekeepers who have gone out of their way to keep walls and surfaces highly sanitized; financial people who keep our facility running and who get grants and other funds to support our budget overrides because of Covid-19, and then accounting for their use. Most importantly, the nurses and CNAs who, under the capable and compassionate leadership of Director of Nursing, Dennis Ayotte, RN, discharge their duties with love and kindness and put themselves at risk every single day. Your family is truly our family and we are honored that you have entrusted them to our care.

We are deeply indebted to all our staff and are forever grateful for their remarkable service in these most difficult times.
